Your Turn

"Your turn", two simple words that are the start of a magical transformation. A spring comes to your steps as you walk over and pick up your helmet. You don't realize the process has started until you slide into the seat and slip on the helmet.

Your breathing quickens as you fasten the seat belts and you can feel the adrenalin as you turn the key. Your heart beats just a tad bit faster as you pull up to the starter and await his signal.

The starter flashes the flag and suddenly the outside world, the humdrum of the daily 9-5, the mortgage bill and everything else disappears. It's you and the car against the clock! Your eyes sweep the path in front of you and man and machine become one as you rush towards the first gate.

Quickly, you look for the next set of cones. Looking for that special line that will let you flow through the course. You are only vaguely aware of the first set of cones flying by just inches away from your tire.

trade-ins, sold two of those, bought a car at the Mecum Auction, sold it (to our very own webmaster, Brad Sneade!), and had to "hitch" a ride since there wasn't any cars to drive home! (read: might as well put them on the truck if the truck's there). What amazed me was the wheeling-dealing going on between the dealers themselves – every dealer there had a mental list of the cars their customers were looking for back home and they spent three days swapping them around until they got what they wanted. Craziness.

Several of our buyers were like you and I though, and were simply there to find the right car and drive it home. This was the case with the guy who bought one of the ZR1's; he was there specifically to buy a nice LT5. When he decided on ours (there were only about 5-6 for sale) he pulled out a giant bag – and paid for the car in cash! I spent almost two hours counting and recounting hundred-dollar bills! One of the other cars, a trade-in, was only on "our lot" for a few hours before we sold it to someone looking specifically for a Millennium Yellow C5. And it was bought by a guy across the isle from us who had just sold his black C5 ten minutes earlier! More craziness.

All in all it was an enlightening experience. I had no idea what to expect and was treated with a first-hand view of the specialty car dealer business "trade show" style, meaning "We're not in Triangle anymore Dorothy". I remember writing a letter similar to this when I first rode in Dick Hammaker's car at an autocross, and again on my first trip to Carlisle, and I'm happy to add this event to my **never ending** list of Corvette-firsts!

The Trials and Tribulations Continue on the 63 Restoration

As I write this segment of the "As the 1963 Coupe Restoration Turns", its a beautiful, bright and sunny, early September day, the type of day you would love to cruise in your Vette. It's just not Friday, September 5th, but it's the day I have waiting for the past several months. I finally get to pick up the Corvette, providing all goes well with the finishing touches. Even if it's only for a weekend visit, I have to return it Monday for some final touches.

The restoration began June 6th when I delivered the car to Dominic Ferrria's shop in Springfield for a few repairs. The original visit to Dominic was to make sure the brakes were good, so I got the parts, new brake pads (it has drum brakes) and brake restoration kit from ZIP Corvette to do all four drums. In addition, I had a small list of items that needed to only be repaired. I just didn't have the time to do things with my travelling. I really didn't know the extent to which the restoration, but did know it needed one. So that is why at first I elected to have a few items fixed, mainly the brakes, noisy valves and lifters. I had no idea what we found once the valve covers came off. which did result in a full engine rebuild. The small repairs turned into major repairs, which eventually resulted in a frame-on restoration. What started out to be something I could easily pay ended up emptying out my pocketbook and maxing out credit cards with 0 balances. But, in retrospect, since I can finally see the results, it's worth it every penny spent and I have to confess having a loving and understanding wife made life bearable.

When I first decided to buy a classic, I heard the repeating theme by people who have gone through restorations "It takes longer then expected, costs much more then expected and will continue during the time you own the car." Boy, can I understand those words now. In fairness, if you're a dedicated owner of an Classic Corvette, and you have the patience and passion for a project, then its worth the aggravations, expenses, and wait for a result. But as I am also told, the restoration never stops, it's ongoing.

During the restoration, the entire engine and compartment, drive train, transmission, cooling system, brake system, interior, steering, electrical, and exterior has been restored back to the condition it would have been like in 1963. It's very difficult to find certain items that are not being reproduced. This means you are working with a limited market on items that have been reconditioned, rebuilt and restored. I have gone through three Master Brake Cylinders before I found one that was correct and worked. But I have to tell you; it looks great and was worth it, because it's correct.

One area that presented its own distinct problem are reproduced parts and the vendors who claim the parts are the same specifications and material as the originals. Although they look good coming out of the box, sometimes the fit is a bit off and more often way off. So this leaves you searching again for one that is correct.

A good example of that comes to mind is the search for the correct water pump. The L-76 (340 HP Hi-Per Engine) requires a water pump that has a top water line that runs into the intake providing cooling to the aluminum intake manifold. So I ordered one that was "exact reproduction of the original down to the casting numbers". I opened the box and was really impressed; it looked great, even though the box read "Made in Poland". Then the problem reared its ugly head. The back plane cover of the water pump was too wide. When it was bolted to the block, the pump went over the L-76 Timing Chain Cover (which was wider then a normal time chain cover on the L-75 300 HP version of the 327). The rear cover plate of the water pump is about 1/16th of an inch thicker then the original, making it impossible to bolt the pump to the engine block without the water ports/tunnels having large gaps. The fix was simple, remove the back plate of the original pump and screw it on to the new pump. We had to glass bead and paint the old one, but it looks new, the water pump fits to the block, problem solved. That was rather a simple problem, but still something you did not expect to run across during the rebuild and takes time and more labor.

This is a more complicated one, and we still are working on it. It has to do with the alignment of the pulley system. This 327 block has a very basic pulley system, as the car does not have air or power steering. An "Idle Pulley" is used and located on the driver's side of the block adjacent to the water pump. The purpose of the idler is to keep tension on the belt between the pulleys so during hard acceleration the belt does not pop off the pulleys. The entire idler system was missing from the block, which is not unusual to find. If you look at most midyears you will find many people took them off, because a bearing on the idle pulley would wear out. Also, the harmonic balancer of the L-76 is about 8 inches in diameter, almost 4 inches larger then the L-75 (300 HP) 327 engine. This means the pulleys for the water pump (which is different in the L-76) and the crank pulley are larger circumferences then the stock version. Since original pulleys of this type and casting numbers are almost impossible to find, I purchased reproduction parts. Guess what, the pulleys when mounted on the water pump and crank overlapped each other's by about 1/8 of an inch. So for now, I have put back the L-75 pulleys until the new order L-76 pulleys found in Canada

made by GM arrive. The repro Crank Pulley Circumference is much larger then the GM product over ½ inch. The next problem was alignment of the pulley system with the idler, alternator, crank and water pump (thank God I don't have to reckon with power steering or air conditioning). Final step is to purchase the correct belt. I think we're almost there; it's a matter of alignment and using washers as spacers to obtain that pulley alignment and getting the correct belt.

Another challenge (more then a challenge, it's was a problem) we ran across was the getting and installing the correct carburetor. It had to be a certain model 3461S Carter AFB that was used for manual transmissions. I found the correct model and it was completely restored by a person in Manassas, known to do Top Flight NCRS carburetor restorations. It was very expensive but the date code and model was 100% accurate for my L-76. When we got it on the manifold (which was purchase as being totally restored) we had vacuum leaks and the studs to hold the carburetor were stripped. Well this set us back a little, we re-threaded the stud holes, and decked the carburetor port area, and this fixed the vacuum leak. But once we got the car running the carburetor leaked gas....so we had to remove it. I brought it back to the person who built this, and he immediately took it apart while I waited to find and fix the problem. What we thought were bad gaskets turned out to be a piece of dirt caught in the jet, causing the float to stick open, thus letting a flood of gas into the bowl. Well it was cleaned, tested (on a motor) and reinstalled. Then we tried tuning the car, and when the car got warm, the carburetor warm air choke did not function, making the car idles high. We took apart the choke and found the plate that guides the choke lever was on backwards, not allow the lever to drop and put the car in a lower idle level. This was fixed and the carburetor runs great.

Once we got the entire car back together, we checked the headlights, and since the time I brought it into the shop, the drivers light motor (what turns the light bucket around to give you headlights) failed. Of course this is another hard part to find, and expensive. Found it and replaced it, now it appears the right light motor (although it still works but is slow) is working, so I have found another one and will install it next week.

Not all things I found ended up with full replacement, for example, of course if you cruise you need a radio right? Well I have the "Wonderbar" AM/FM stock 1963 original radio in the car, and from the day I got it, the radio did not seem to work. I could faintly pick up stations, a lot of fade and poor sound quality. Since I know a little about this, I troubleshot the radio and everything looked good within the output of the radio, then I focused on the antenna system. What I found was the entire antenna system was off a 1967 Chevrolet Impala, crossed referenced part numbers. The Corvette, because it is fiberglass, uses a large grounding plane that is under the glass the antenna bolts too and has a large copper grounding wire that must be attached to the frame. The Impala is metal and uses the body as the plane. You guessed it; no ground on the antenna, the antenna did not fit properly, so I had to buy a complete 1963 antenna system. It's now installed and the radio works great...I can get all the FM and AM stations. In the beginning I thought I would need to buy a new radio, and really did not have the money to buy it or have the radio restored. A little victory in a larger war.

It seems like everything you do can't be straightforward. If you replace a simple part, it either does not fit, does not work, needs to be modified, or you find another part that needs to be replaced to make the first part you replace work or look better. The reward comes when things to come together and it works, you feel a sense of accomplishment.

Well what's left after I finish the engine? I have been talking to "Stingray Auto Body" in Purcellville, VA. Charlie (the owner) will be looking at the car and doing some touch ups on some paint blisters I have. These bubbles are caused when the surface (fiberglass) has been stripped of paint using a solvent, and was not properly cleaned. Once paint is applied over this ill cleaned area, and the paint dries, vapors (left over from the solvent, start by exposing the car to sunlight, which translates into heat. Since the paint does not allow air to escape, bubble start to blister the paint. This is very commonly found on older restorations. Depending what one finds under the blister when you break it and remove it, it's a fairly simple process to fix by paint matching and blending. I have five bubbles, one large one, and some very minor bodywork to be done. The paint on this car is still very good with about 8 years left on it. So I hope to get away with a minimum amount of painting and bodywork.

Once this is finished, the car will be in excellent condition. But, I still want to continue to do smaller project along the way. I can see the light at the end of the tunnel. To date I have spent almost as much to restore the car as I did to buy the car. Meg and I plan to go to Ocean City for Corvettes at the Ocean, and my plan is to take the 63. We will see.

My stories about the 63 restorations are not meant to be self-promoting, but intended to be informative as well as entertaining for people who have done, are thinking about, and will do their own restorations. Of course if you are doing or intend to do a restoration, I am ready to help with all sorts of advice based on my experiences. So for now I will close and hope you will be

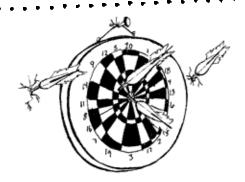
