QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF - WHERE ARE THE "TRICKY" SECTIONS OF THIS TRACK?

You find yourself at new track and of course the first question you ask: What is the longest straightaway? And as you already know, the turn before that longest straightaway, is the most important turn on the track. If you don't take that turn correctly, you sacrifice speed all the way down that long straightaway.



Ok, now what is the 2nd longest straightaway?

Well, let me suggest that there is at least ONE more set of questions you might want to ask the track.

Which turn(s) can get you into the most trouble?

- From a technical point of view, is there a late apex turn with no run off area? If you have too much entry speed, will you run out of "run off room" and hit a barrier? What dependable landmarks can you use to get the proper line into the late apex?
- Are there any blind turns, or very restricted sight lines? Where are the flagging stations before those turns? You don't want to be the 3rd car into the pile up because you weren't looking at the flagging station. The correct check list for every turn starts with "glance" at the flagging station. Don't rely on "movement" in your peripheral vision to alert you to a flag that is waving. How many checkered flags have you gone past and have not seen?
- Are there any long fast sweepers where an early apex would cause you to "track out" off the track at speed? You need to document landmarks on the horizon to line up the correct apex. Towers, trees, inside marks of the guardrails, the number 5 red curbing stripe?
- What are the run-off options for this turn? You want your "Plan B" options planned ahead of time, before you need them.

Case in point: The uphill esses and the bridge at Watkins Glen

- Trouble? The bridge itself is the narrowest part of the whole course. There is no run off room here.
- A late apex is not a problem here. The later the better.
- Trouble? The uphill section is very fast sweeper (some with speeds well over 120) and you can't see the bridge itself as you come up the hill. Is it hiding a small collection of bent cars?
- Trouble? If you early apex the turn before the bridge at 130+ mph, you could track out into the right side of the bridge... and ricochet to the left side. And very fast cars are following very closely in back of you. The new pavement covered up everyone's previous "on track surface" land marks.
- As you come up the hill you are staring right at the most important flagging station on the track, in my
 opinion. That is if you have "checking flag stations" on your check list!

Track Notes

The hard part (well not hard, just not done enough) pull out your track notes from you last visits!

Document your track notes for each track you drive on. Document your findings for each turn, each flagging station, each land mark, run off area - or not, etc., for the whole track. They can be as simple as notes on a track map or as detailed as 3-4 pages in a note book. Use graphics, draw arrows, etc.

TRIVIA By John Scott

- Q1. (For those who've been members for less than two years) The 1963 Corvette the first of the C-2s sported a number of ground-breaking features, including one not seen on an American car since the 1942 Desoto. What was it?
- A1. Hidden headlights. Hidden headlights would be a hallmark of Corvettes until the C-6 debuted in 2006.
- Q2. (For Rick Poage.) In 1967 Corvette offered the L88 427 ci engine as an option for an additional \$950.00. To discourage street use (as if the price wasn't discouraging enough), GM rated the engine at 430 horsepower (5 hp less than the L71 427 engine). What was the "real" horsepower output of the L88, and how

many L88-equipped Corvettes did GM build in 1967? [Rounding to the nearest ten is good enough.]

- A2. According to "Corvette 60th Anniversary" by the editors of Consumer Guide Automotive, the L88 put out at least 560 horsepower. 20 L88-equipped Corvettes were built in 1967.
- Q3. The Corvette saw a "first" and a "last" in the engine department in 1965. What were they?
- A3. The 1965 model year was the first year you could get a factory option big block engine (a 425 hp 396 ci) in a Corvette. It was the last year you could get a fuel injected Corvette until 1984.
- Q4. What three exterior body features help the viewer distinguish between the 1963 and 1964 Corvette coupes? [An answer with any two will be accepted.]

A4. The differences are:

- The split rear window in the '63 is a single piece of glass in the '64.
- The decorative vents in the '63 hood are gone in the '64 (although the hood indentations remain; the indentations vanished in 1965).
- The side roof vents in the '63 are nonfunctional; the driver's side roof vent is functional in the '64.
